Getting Here

By Car

Take the Mitchell Freeway north, turn right at the end of the freeway and turn left at Wanneroo Road. Head 90 kilometres north (Wanneroo Road turns into Indian Ocean Drive) and look for the Lancelin turn-off. The journey typically takes around 90 minutes.

By Coach

Transwa runs a coach service to and from Lancelin twice a week. Call 1300 662 205 or visit <u>www.transwa.wa.gov.au</u> for the latest schedules. The small coastal town of Lancelin is home to around 700 people, but that figure triples over Christmas/New Year. It's sandwiched between impressive sand dunes and the calm waters of Lancelin Bay and enjoys a warm and temperate climate.

It has long been a lobster fishing town but today, more and more visitors are discovering the joys of this charming seaside hamlet. Here you can <u>sandboard</u> and descend a 40 metre dune at speed or take a <u>guad bike or buggy tour</u> or <u>4WD adventure bus tour</u> of the extensive Off Road area. There's great surf at the Back Beach, swimming, snorkelling and boating in the bay, kitesurfing, windsurfing and so much more.

Sand Dumes

Every year tens of thousands flock to Lancelin's Off Road area to immerse themselves in these pristine white sand dunes. Most come to <u>sandboard</u> down dunes up to 40m high, while others opt to tour the dunes on a <u>guad bike, huggy</u> or <u>4WD bus tour</u>; few leave disappointed. The area also attracts plenty of 4 wheel drivers and trail bike riders given its proximity to Perth.

There's no charge to enter the Off Road area which is accessed from Beacon Street. If you're coming to sandboard and have a 2 wheel drive vehicle, park in the car park near the entry track. For those with a 4WD, you can park at the bottom of the dunes.

Sandboanding

Sandboarding is fun and inexpensive. You can ride sitting or standing, solo or tandem and unlike snowboarding, no special training or skill is required - it's dead easy. There's no age limit, but youngsters are best riding tandem with an adult. Access to the dunes is free of charge and you can ride between 10am and 5:30pm 365 days a year.

You'll need a sandboard (forget boogie boards or surfboards - they simply won't slide). Get more information at <u>www.lancelin.com.au</u>. Boards start from just \$10 for up to 1 hour and that includes wax which you apply to the board before each descent.





Ready for an adrenaline rush? Well, explore Lancelin's extensive sand dunes on a late model quad bike or buggy!

You'll be abuzz for days after experiencing one of these 90-minute ATV/UTV <u>adventure tours</u> around the magnificent Lancelin Off Road area.

You'll be guided by an experienced rider so no prior Off Road riding experience is necessary. Tours are suitable for adults and children, and you can ride solo or tandem.

Back Beach



The Back Beach is Lancelin's most popular beach and is located at the south end of the bay. Entry is via Fisher Way with 4WDs able to take the track and park on the beach. Those less adventurous drivers can park at the car park and walk over the dune.

The beach is a haven for surfers, boogie boarders, bodysurfers, kitesurfers and swimmers. It's not patrolled though and there can be a strong rip, so please play it safe. Like everywhere along the coast, the best conditions are in the morning before the sea breeze arrives.

SURFING

The Back Beach is Lancelin's premier surfing beach.

You can surf, SUP or boogie board all year round, although the pick of the months are March, April, May, June, October and November when the winds are lighter and the weather warmer.

Lancelin has been a lobster fishing town since 1950. Today, around 20 commercial boats ply the rich waters off the coast for lobster (crayfish). These creatures are prized around the world and much of Lancelin's catch finds its way onto the plates of diners all over Asia.

Amateurs with the appropriate fishing license can take lobster all year, although there are some restrictions to fishing for them at night.

The commercial fishing season runs year-round and from October 2020 you'll be able to <u>buy live</u> <u>lobsters</u> straight from the commercial boats as they dock at the jetty. These can be ordered online at <u>www.lancelin.com.au</u>. Prices depend on supply and demand and will be promoted on the website. Once you've ordered your lobsters, you will simply roll up to the jetty on the day and collect them; you won't get them any fresher!





Grab your tackle and head to the jetty where you'll find Herring, Whiting, Squid, Tailor and occasionally a sizable Samson fish.


Beach fishing offers some fine catches, particularly at dusk at the north point.

You can also book a land-based fishing tour or head out on a <u>charter boat</u> for the likes of Snapper, Baldchin Groper, Dhufish or game fish.

Note: The Demersal ban runs from October 15 to December 15 inclusive; no Demersal fish (e.g. Snapper, Dhufish, Baldchin Groper) can be taken during that time.









Boaties have long been attracted to the calm waters of Lancelin Bay and the superb fishing further out. The best conditions for boating are normally in the morning as the sea breeze is often in by noon.

There is no boat ramp in Lancelin but you can beach-launch your craft either side of the jetty as per this picture or head 500 metres south to Cunliffe Street and launch from the beach there. If there's a surge though, launching and retrieving can be tricky for the newcomer, so be prepared, be quick and if you have access to a tractor, you'll find this the best option.

If you're heading outside of the bay, you should only cross the reef via the prescribed paths and inform Lancelin Volunteer Marine Rescue of your plan on VHF 22 or VMR688.

Did you know?

The world's oldest message in a bottle was found 30 kilometres north of Lancelin in January 2018! The bottle, containing a scrolled note (left), was tossed overboard from the German ship Paula in 1886. It remained "lost" for 131 years and 223 days before being found on a dune just 60 metres from the high water mark after a storm. Lancelin Island is the larger of the two islands off the mainland and is at the northern end of the bay just 700 metres from shore. Today it's an A class reserve with a fish habitat protection area to the west and a sheltered beach to the east. It has a maximum elevation of 29 metres and last century it was used as a bombing target.

Those with their own boat/watercraft can access the island. Once there, you are only permitted on the eastern and western side beaches and the boardwalk that crosses the island. There's also an offshoot that takes you to a viewing platform.

The island is home to many birds including Terns, the Common Noddy, Gulls, Pied Cormorant and others. It's the second most diverse seabird breeding island in WA after Pelsaert Island in the Abrolhos.

Edwards Island (also known as Edward Island) is at the south end of the bay and occupies an area of .454 hectares with a maximum elevation of 5 metres. The island sits between 50 and 150 metres from shore depending on the time of year. Like Lancelin Island, it is an A Class nature reserve. It is home to many birds and access is prohibited.

Vid you know!

The Guinness World Record for the Largest Convoy of Off Road Vehicles was set in 2016 on Lancelin's sand dunes! 449 4WDs travelled 3.2kms, 2 car lengths apart.



Lancelin's Off Road area is open every day of the year from 8am to 7pm. Entry is free but all vehicles need to be licensed. If your vehicle is not road registered you can secure an Off Road license for under \$20.

Be aware that the Off Road area does not run the full north to south length of the dunes. Only the middle third is open to the general public.

Supporting local initiatives

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From December to early February, eager kitesurfers flock to Lancelin's beaches to take advantage of the strong and reliable south easterly winds.

Kitesunfing

Most of the action takes place in the late afternoon at the south point, with surfers setting off from Grace Darling Park where there's parking, a rigging area and a public toilet/shower.

Bring your own sailing gear and revel in near perfect conditions.









Lancelin is one of Australia's premier windsurfing destinations. It is also home to the annual Lancelin Ocean Classic the longest windsurfing marathon in the world held each January since 1986.

During the summer months, windsurfers from around the world head to Lancelin chasing the perfect wave and reliable winds. They are never disappointed.

In the past you could hire gear here but today you'll need to bring your own kit.

Lancelin Bay is protected by outer reefs and islands that create ideal conditions for all manner of calm water activities: from swimming, snorkelling and jet skiing, to fishing, boating and <u>SUPing</u>.

A walk from the north point to the south point of Lancelin Bay and back measures 5.4 kilometres and most can do it in under an hour. Take a friend and enjoy a chat.







Tag your Insta sunset posts #lancelinwa

One never tires of watching the sun set over the Indian Ocean, and in Lancelin, we are regularly treated to some stunning displays of colour. And don't be too quick to leave as the best displays often come 15-30 minutes after the sun has set.

There are numerous vantage points to observe the sun setting over the Indian Ocean, including the lookout, <u>either of</u> the <u>two hotels</u>, Grace Darling Park, Harold Park, the sand dunes and the jetty. Oh, and keep a lookout for the green flash. It is a meteorological optical phenomena that sometimes occurs as the sun disappears over the horizon. When the conditions are right, a distinct green spot is briefly visible above the upper rim of the sun's disk; the green appearance usually lasts for no more than two seconds.

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

Hook up to the rec fishing rules

Make sure you know all the rules before you head out to fish around Lancelin. For fishing rules, bag and size limits, visit fish.wa.gov.au/rules

- Use a powered boat? Get your Recreational Fishing Boat Licence from transport.wa.gov.au/DotDirect
- No fishing, jet skis, anchoring or landing a boat within the Lancelin Island Fish Habitat Protection Area.
- Demersal fishing closure
 15 October 15 December inclusive.
- Minimum legal size for pink snapper landed in Lancelin is 500mm.
- Licences are needed to fish for lobster, marron and abalone (no abalone fishing north of Moore River). For seasonal advice check fish.wa.gov.au/guide
- ID fish and access the rules when out of phone range with free Recfishwest app.
